

Acrimony for ALP?

SYDNEY. — Today's New South Wales ALP annual conference promises even livelier and more acrimonious debate than usual, with factional tensions running high over the future of two senior right-wing frontbenchers.

Heated debate was expected to flare over the preselection row during the three-day meeting, which comes amid allegations of a branch stacking war between rival factions.

It will be the seventh conference for Opposition leader Bob Carr as leader, and ALP chiefs were hoping to play down factional differences long enough to keep his speech tomorrow at centre stage.

However, tensions about the suspended ballot in the Paul Whelan's seat of Ashfield and the future of dumped Peter Anderson were expected to be thrashed out on the conference floor.

Negotiations between left and right wingers have continued in the week leading up to the conference, and party organisers say that while they expect lively debate an outcome was unlikely.

Left wingers are insisting the rank and file ballot in Ashfield, suspended by the ALP executive earlier this year when it appeared right winger Mr Whelan would lose, go ahead.

It will be the party's final annual conference ahead of the March state election, and Mr Carr's speech was expected to map out the party's direction.

Mr Carr yesterday gave his support to State ALP general secretary John Della Bosca, say-

ing his financial rescue plan in the face of the party's \$10 million debt had been the result of very hard work.

The Administrative committee has come up with a financial package, expected to be presented to the conference, to shore up the party's finances ahead of the March state election in 1995.

The plan involves a deal with the Commonwealth Bank which allows the party to re-schedule its debts until its major asset, Labor Centenary House, has been redeveloped.

"He has done the party a large service," Mr Carr said in a statement.

"It ranks with his brilliant strategic management of Labor's May 1991 election campaign.

"I look forward to John Della Bosca being my campaign director in 1995."

Mr Della Bosca is facing a challenge from left wing unionist Damian O'Connor, which was not expected to succeed, but was likely to provide an outlet for any delegates angry with his stewardship.

The conference will also to hear from Federal Treasurer Ralph Willis today and the National ALP secretary, Gary Grey, who will deliver an address on Monday.

It was also expected to mark the absence as a delegate, of former Federal minister and power broker Graham Richardson, who will not officially be at the conference for the first time in two decades, after his resignation from Parliament earlier this year.

Organic food helps sperm

LONDON. — Organic farmers who eat pesticide-free food produce a significantly higher number of sperm than other men, according to a Danish study into the effects of chemicals on human fertility.

The findings, published in Britain's Lancet medical journal, are likely to fuel a debate over whether pesticides and food additives are to blame for a decline in male fertility seen in the last half-century.

Fulfilling a desire he held for years to skydive, the family of Seebren Reeves, 33, chose a jump school a friend recommended for their weekend present.

1000 dead in Colombia

NEIVA, Colombia. — President Cesar Gaviria declared a state of emergency yesterday in a remote mountain valley devastated by an earthquake and mudslide after government officials said the tragedy had claimed up to 1000 lives.

Government officials appealed for donations of clothes, blankets and kitchen utensils to help thousands of refugees who lost their homes and farms in Monday's disaster in the poor and mainly Indian Paez valley, 300km south-west of Bogota.

Moscow offered peace role

ISTANBUL, Turkey. — Offering Moscow a 'special relationship' befitting a nuclear power, NATO hoped to draw Russia into its Partnership for Peace co-operation accord.

But the alliance stopped short of granting its former enemy any say in policy making, and Moscow's reaction was not immediately known.

Dead housemaid in luggage

COLOMBO. — A Sri Lankan housemaid in Lebanon smuggled out by air the body of a colleague by checking it on board an aircraft as her accompanied baggage, a press report here.

Liyanapathirana Somalatha arrived in Colombo late last month with the body of another Sri Lankan housemaid Mudiyansele Ariyawathi, who had died in Lebanon following a motor accident on May 26, the Sinhalese Lankadeepa said.

JOINT STATEMENT - SHADOW MINISTER FOR THE ENVIRONMENT - SHADOW
MINISTER FOR FORESTS

LABOR TO RESTRUCTURE FORESTRY COMMISSION

'Labor will completely overhaul the NSW Forestry Commission and restructure its management of State Forests along efficient and environmentally responsible principles, Shadow Ministers Pam Allan and Jack Hallam said today.

'Labor in Government will ensure the PAC's wide-ranging recommendations are implemented, Mr Hallam said.

A total restructure of the Commission is essential to separate forest policy functions from day to day management.

The new structure will include a corporatised board which will feature:

- * an independent chairperson who is commercially qualified and will be appointed by the Minister from outside the Commission and the industry;
- * a board member will be appointed on the nomination of the peak environment and conservation groups;
- * a board member will be appointed on the nomination of the forest industries;
- * and a board member will be appointed on the nomination of the New South Wales Labour Council.

'This structure is a major departure from the existing arrangements.

'It gives environmental groups direct participation in the formulation and structure of policy.

'Two of the three existing Commissioners' positions will be abolished, and the existing Commissioner will become the Chief Executive reporting directly to the Board.

'Labor agrees with the findings of the Public Accounts Committee and is particularly concerned about such matters as under-pricing of raw materials, the determination of royalties and concerns about local government rating, Mr Hallam said.

Ms Allan said the new structure would ensure public accountability and scrutiny in relation to the Commission's sustained yield policy.

'And compulsory EIS's for all proposed logging programs will restore public confidence in the proper management of our forests.

'The appointment of a conservationist to the Board of Directors will give environmentalists a much needed 'watchdog' over Commission practices, she said.

Mr Hallam said Labor in Government will establish a Ministerial working party to respond specifically to the PAC's findings.

He said Labor's policy for eucalypt plantations have been given greater emphasis following the PAC's findings and include:

- * a strategy to establish eucalypt plantation sharefarming on the State's North Coast
- * research will be undertaken to work out the best way to make eucalypt plantations most profitable
- * actively encourage landholders to establish woodlots on previously cleared lands on a joint venture share farming basis with the NSW Forestry Commission
- * seek Commonwealth implementation of taxation incentives for plantation establishment on previously cleared agricultural lands.
- * place greater emphasis on plantations utilising species native to the particular region
- * encourage research and development into species that grow faster, species that are pest resistant as well as improved growing methods.

Mr Hallam said Labor in government will also review and monitor the role of the Timber Advisory Council to ensure the maximisation of value-adding to forest products occurs.

'Our policies will ensure all activities of the Forestry Commission are carefully scrutinised and that our State forests will be managed to achieve long-term ecological sustainability, the Shadow Ministers said.

GREENISS AGREED TO ALP'S FORESTRY COMMISSION PLAN

The plan by the NSW ALP to restructure the NSW Forestry Commission was an important development on the long road to transforming the Commission into an organisation that can meet the modern day demand for an ecologically sustainable forest industry', said Jeff Angel, Assistant Director of the Total Environment Centre today.

'There is much work to be done to stop the massive damage being caused to the remaining native forests by the timber extraction policies of the Commission.'

'For the first time a political party has recognised the fundamental right of the environment, and to be directly involved in the management of the state's native forests. Nevertheless, the ALP policy will need further work on it to meet environmentalists' demands.'

'We call on the State Government to also announce its policy for the Commission. At present, all indications are that it is colluding with the Forestry Commission to make secret and minimal adjustments to the Commission, without public involvement.'

Agenda for Reform

'It must be said however, that our proposals for transforming the Commission go further than those of the ALP. In particular quite radical restructuring of the native forest control process is necessary to overcome its 'corporate culture' which has made it the overlord of massive damage to our old growth and high conservation forests', Mr Angel said.

'The Commission should not own the forests as it does now but rather apply to an independent forest conservation body, to log them in competition with other demands such as national parks and nature reserves. At the moment it is judge and jury in timber policies and environmental impact assessment', he said.

'The Shadow Ministers for Environment and Forests today released a policy to overhaul the Forestry Commission, including a board member nominated by environment groups to a newly corporatized Commission. It follows the damning report by the NSW Parliament Public Accounts Committee into the Forestry Commission.'

CONFIDENTIAL

1 The NSW Forestry Act and administration of the NSW Forestry Commission will be reformed to give primacy to:

- * conservation goals through environment protection plans;
- * transition plans for timber getting currently based on native forests, to plantations;
- * transfer of lands to the National Parks and Wildlife Service;
- * improved environmental research, and;
- * improved methods of public participation in the management of native forests.

2 The Commission shall be charged with transferring timber getting operations from native forests to pine and hardwood plantations as expeditiously as possible by the development of transition plans and financial assistance derived from its revenue surplus.

3 The Commission shall be directly involved in the management of native forests in private hands by the development of management plans and imposition of environmental standards at least equivalent to its own.

4 The Commission shall ensure the efficient use of timber and arrangements to achieve this, in the forest and the mill, will be reflected in timber supply agreements and licences

5 The Commission shall charge royalties that reflect the real social, economic and environmental costs of timber from the state's native forests and plantations.

6. The environmental standards used by the Commission to control logging, guidelines in the preparation of management plans, public involvement and research will be subject to independent review by the proposed Environment Protection Authority and open for public and scientific comment.

7. Where native forests are logged they will be done so on an environmentally sustainable basis that ensures the retention of diversity and habitat to ensure the continuation of all flora and fauna species for all time.

8. Third party rights shall be afforded in the Forestry and other relevant Acts, to allow the restraint or remedy of a breach of the Forestry Act or environmental regulations by any person or group of persons, whether incorporated or unincorporated.

9. Management plans, environmental and logging codes and agreements or licences to supply timber shall be publicly reviewed every 5 years and be supplied to any person free of charge, upon request.

10. The native forest lands controlled by the NSW Forestry Commission shall be vested in a Forest Conservation Council, which shall decide which forests will be allocated to timber production and under what logging regimes. It shall commission independent scientific advice as to the conservation of forests communities and environmentally sustained yields in NSW and provide lands for dedication as national parks and nature reserves.

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LABOR'S ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAMME



**BOB CARR AND THE ALP
A BETTER WAY**



INTRODUCTION

The New South Wales Labor Party has endorsed a comprehensive energy conservation programme as part of the charter of Labor's Greenhouse Impact Commission.

If New South Wales is to contribute to the worldwide reduction of greenhouse gases, it must adopt the international target of a 20 percent reduction in carbon dioxide levels by the year 2005.

A comprehensive energy conservation programme is essential to achieve this target.

In addition to environmental rewards, significant economies can be achieved by reducing power demand and petroleum use.

Indeed, without a long term strategy to increase efficiency in petroleum use, Australia will face increasing balance of payments problems.

LABOR'S RECORD IN GOVERNMENT

While there was not the general community awareness of Greenhouse during the term of the former Labor Government, a number of significant energy conservation initiatives were taken. Most of these have been wound down or abandoned by the current Government.

Once, the nationally recognised leader in energy conservation under Labor, New South Wales now trails very badly behind Victoria and most other States.

Government staff engaged in energy conservation has dropped from 40 under Labor to two today.

The McDonnell report, commissioned by Labor provided the framework for a major restructuring of the Electricity Commission of New South Wales and County Councils. It confirmed the economic sense of the former Government's emphasis on conservation and energy management.

THE GREINER GOVERNMENT'S RECORD

There is apparent conflict between the direction and goals of the Electricity Commission of New South Wales and the environmental objectives to which the Government pays lip service.

Conflicting energy policies and ministerial statements show there is little commitment to energy conservation in the Greiner Government.

The Electricity Commission's 30 year plan all but ignores the issue of energy conservation. And while the Minister for Mineral and Energy has established a Government Committee to review energy conservation policies, this Committee has failed to produce a report.

At the first public hearings of the Government Committee, the Australian Consumers Association was most critical of the Greiner Government's record.

The ACA said: "high expectations of the sincerity and effectiveness of the New South Wales Government's energy policies have produced great disappointment".

This statement generally summarises the Government's progress on energy conservation.

Speaking at the Electricity Supply Engineers Association Annual Conference, the Minister for Minerals and Energy spoke of the need to reduce CO2 levels.

At the same time, the General Manager of ECNSW implored engineers to: "look to see where we can make more sales to use that extra capacity".

THE OPTIONS

Rising greenhouse gas concentrations are directly related to human energy use.

Therefore, the greatest potential for reducing greenhouse gas emissions will come from measures which alter the patterns of energy use in transport, electricity generation, and commercial and domestic energy consumption.

There are essentially two broad options for the Government. On one hand, a 'hard' energy option which involves substituting current uses of oil and coal with either gas and/or nuclear fuels while continuing to expand the overall levels of energy consumption.

Alternatively, there is a 'soft' energy option which involves an extensive commitment to energy efficiency measures, and the widespread use of renewable energy, mainly solar, in many industrial and domestic applications.

This will provide the same or better quality energy to the community more cheaply and with lower impact on the environment.

Labor rejects some conventional wisdom which locks our energy system into total dependence on polluting fossil fuels and/or nuclear power.

Considerable progress has been made in solar energy research which enables it to meet most domestic and some commercial/industrial heating requirements. An energy policy based on developing conservation and efficiency measures, promises to be more attractive to governments in terms of its lower capital outlay and greater potential for job creation. It will also make a greater contribution to reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Accordingly, the next New South Wales Labor Government will promote an environmentally sensitive energy programme for the 1990's.

However, it needs to be recognised that the transition to an energy system based on renewables and energy efficiency needs to be managed carefully. An intermediate program combining a mix of both fossil fuels and renewable/efficiency measures will be necessary in the short term. Financial investment in existing infrastructure must also be taken into account, but it must not be used to avoid essential policy initiatives.

LABOR'S COMMITMENT

To meet the target of a 20 percent reduction in CO2 levels, Labor will implement a comprehensive energy conservation program in its first term of Government. This will be known as the Labor Government's Strategic Energy Conservation Environment Initiative.

The importance of protecting our environment cannot be overstated. Steps to reduce carbon dioxide emissions must be taken now. The longer we wait, the more expensive and disruptive the necessary changes will become.

It is estimated that for every \$5.00 invested in energy efficiency, \$15.00 is saved in capital outlay. This saves one tonne of CO2 being emitted in the atmosphere per annum.

STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Of all the Australian States, New South Wales is the largest emitter of Greenhouse gases. Labor accepts that its overall responsibility in Government is to reduce CO2 emissions, within a comprehensive national framework.

Both the Commonwealth and State Governments have key responsibilities in determining national energy policies. These are defined in the Constitution.

The Commonwealth's relevant powers under the Constitution are largely restricted to the areas of taxation, foreign affairs and (in the case of offshore oil production) energy planning. The States have clearly defined powers in the planning, generation and supply of electricity, mineral and coal resource developments, transportation (public and roads), building design codes, environmental planning (except in the territories, offshore, or World Heritage Areas), pollution control, industry and labour policies (except in relation to Commonwealth departments and instrumentalities and federal awards) and education and training.

Notwithstanding these limitations on Commonwealth powers, however, the Commonwealth in reality exercises more indirect control through the distribution of taxation revenue, through grants to the States and direct funding of other programmes.

COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT'S ROLE

The Commonwealth Government can assist in the reduction of Greenhouse gas emission by initiating a range of Commonwealth policies dealing with taxation, industry assistance, preferential purchasing arrangements, research and development, transportation, education and regional development. It can also seek to lock State Governments into commitments given by Australia through the signing of international treaties which targets and/or limits levels of national Greenhouse emissions.

STATE LABOR GOVERNMENT POLICY

The Australian Constitution allocates the primary responsibility for energy management and environmental planning controls to State Governments. A State Labor Government will immediately move for a co-ordinated New South Wales/Commonwealth approach to energy conservation.

Labor's Energy Conservation Programme will include:

* **INDUSTRY POLICY**

Labor will enact legislation requiring all firms with an energy load of 200 kw in all forms of energy to prepare an energy audit of each plant. The audit will be used to determine the scope for energy efficiency improvements and renewable energy technology applications.

Grants, where necessary, will be provided to industry via NIES extension schemes to assist both in the surveys/energy audits and the design and introduction of energy management plans at individual plants.

Development of a solar and renewable energy manufacturing industry will be encouraged in New South Wales as part of Labor's State Economic Development Strategy. Assistance to be sought from Commonwealth funding.

* **SOLAR ENERGY**

Labor will establish a consortium of private firms with specialist industries, Government and university involvement to promote and develop the solar energy, wind and other renewable energy industries.

We will aim to make New South Wales the world leader in solar energy technology and manufacturing. Immediate moves will be made to take advantage of the advanced work and research currently being undertaken by two of the foremost solar energy technology groups in the world at the University of Sydney and the University of New South Wales.

A Labor Government will assist through a commitment to purchase solar energy units for installation on Department of Housing homes, hospitals, school and other public buildings.

* **PURCHASING POLICY**

All Government departments, statutory authorities and State public enterprises will be required to adopt energy efficiency criteria, passive solar design features and solar hot water heating technology on all new buildings. They will also be required to undertake energy audits and retro-fitting cost/benefit analysis studies on existing buildings of the State Government and all its instrumentalities.

The public energy supply industry will be encouraged to invest in energy efficiency and renewable measures on customer's premises. The purchase of solar hot water systems and space heating for installation in residential and commercial buildings will be one such measure targeted under the program. A rental scheme under which installation, repair and maintenance of such units is carried out by the supply authority will be fully investigated.

The GEMP - Government Energy Management Program, an initiative of the former Government, will be restored. This programme will once again involve all Government Departments, authorities and agencies being co-ordinated in purchases of fuel efficient vehicles for the Government fleet. As part of this program, departments and authorities will be required to undertake energy audits, particularly of new buildings. This programme under the previous Labor Government was estimated to have saved \$135 million.

* R&D POLICY

Labor will review funding provided for energy conservation research in New South Wales. Funding to be supplied by the State Energy R&D Fund. This had a balance of \$6.3 million at March 1990, and receives new funding of over \$2 million per annum. On this basis approximately \$15 million will be available over the Labor Government's first term. A critical review will be undertaken to ensure all research programmes fall within the guidelines of reducing energy demand, reducing Greenhouse gas emissions, developing alternate energy sources and renewable energy. Funding guidelines should also make provision for educational and promotional programmes.

* TECHNOLOGY POLICY

National design standards will be encouraged for renewable technologies to which domestic and foreign manufacturers must comply prior to the release on the local market.

The processes of technology transfer from design to commercial will be streamlined.

Minimum energy efficiency standards will be set for appliances, in consultation with manufacturers.

* **BUILDING CODE POLICY**

A uniform building code based on energy conservation principles will be developed.

This would be negotiated with local government so that the building code allowed for regional variations based on climatic and other determinants. The code will cover building design to provide for correct orientation, insulation and solar access for solar energy collectors.

Significant energy savings can be achieved by better building design. In one US study it was found that in power consumed by lighting alone, annual electricity consumption was 27 kilowatt-hours per square foot in the worst office buildings, 18 kilowatt-hours in typical buildings and 10 to 15 kilowatt-hours in energy efficiency buildings.

Local government will be encouraged to acquaint building inspectors with passive solar design principles, domestic energy conservation and renewable technology applications.

Special programmes will be developed for remote area communities (including Aboriginal communities) which target appropriate renewable technologies according to specific geographical conditions. This will reduce the dependence and cross subsidisation of these communities, on the state electricity grid.

Cost/benefit studies will be undertaken into the feasibility of supplying total heating/cooling and electricity requirements for rural townships in NSW with energy efficiency and renewables (hot water and photovoltaic systems) as an alternative to extending or replacing grid lines to rural communities.

* **ENERGY LABELLING**

The former Labor Government introduced the first energy labelling program in Australia. Under the Greiner Government, the programme has been stalled.

It was estimated that the scheme would save consumers and the supply system 43 mw of power, leading to generation cost savings by 1995 of \$50 million.

Energy labelling will be expanded to cover all energy consuming devices.

* **NATIONAL ELECTRICITY TRANSMISSION GRID**

In Government, Labor entered into an agreement with Victoria and South Australia to establish an interstate electricity grid servicing the three states. This grid was completed and became operational in March, 1990.

A Carr Labor Government will press for a National Electricity Transmission Grid. An immediate conference with the Federal and State Governments will be sought for the implementation of this policy which coincides with the Federal Government's programme on micro-economic reform.

Sharing power has obvious benefits for all States on the eastern seaboard. New South Wales currently has excess capacity, whereas Victoria and Queensland may be required over the next decade to build additional power stations at significant economic and environmental costs.

* **ENERGY ADVISORY CENTRE**

The former Labor Government established a Solar Energy Centre subsequently renamed the Energy Advisory Centre. This centre, originally located in Argyle Place, Sydney, employed nine officers. The Centre's staff has been cut to two employees and is only able to accept limited school visits. This centre has also been relocated in the Geological Mining Museum, which partially compromises its effectiveness and credibility. The centre is now known as the Minerals and Energy Information Centre.

* Labor will revive and relocate the Energy Conservation and Information Centre. The Centre will function as an energy conservation and renewable energy advisory centre, for schools, industry and the wider community. It will disseminate information on more efficient energy use in areas such as home design, renovations, heating/cooling, solar energy and general energy conservation measures.

Labor believes the advisory and information service centre is central to developing community awareness of energy conservation.

* **TRANSPORT POLICY**

Labor will:

- ensure that costings of transport policies take full account of environmental factors;
- improve the efficiency of both passenger and freight rail transport to ensure their optimum use;
- provide for dedicated public transport corridors in new residential release areas;

- fund research from the State Energy R&D Fund into the development of alternative bio-fuels such as ethanol and by conducting studies into the feasibility of running the metropolitan bus, mini-bus and taxi fleets on ethanol fuels;
- ensure that transport planning within the Department of Transport takes account of the decisions and recommendations of the Greenhouse Impact Commission;
- in conjunction with heavy vehicle manufacturers and the road freight industry, set realistic targets for improvements in fuel efficiency;
- press the Federal Government to introduce fuel efficiency standards for new cars of six litres per 100 kilometres for current models, reducing the level to 4.5 litres per 100 kilometres by 2005;
- work with the Federal Government towards a system of rewards for energy efficient vehicles.

More detailed energy transport conservation measures will be announced in Labor's Transport Policy.



How to Give A Grid Reference



The Australian Continent is divided into zones which are 6° of longitude wide. Each zone is covered by a grid with the coordinates given in metres. X coordinates are now called **Eastings** (a 6 digit number for how far east) and Y coordinates are called **Northings** (a 7 digit number for how far north). This system is called the Australian Map Grid or **AMG**.

New South Wales is spanned by 3 zones, **Zone 54** (138° - 144°), **Zone 55** (144° - 150°) and **Zone 56** (150° - 156°). For any given point, the grid reference is given by the zone number, followed by the easting and lastly the northing.

For example, the grid reference for the reservoir on the adjacent map will be:
