

Re: Use of the Domain for Information Displays

I refer to our conversation earlier today. I apologise for not having made an application to the RBGaD Trust prior to this. I regret any concern and anxiety which may have been caused by this communication breakdown.

May I belatedly apply for permission to use the Domain for the display of information about the Fahey Government's 'Natural Resources Package'.

This involves the installation of three tents and a teepee and the display of information boards. It will also involve people who are staffing the displays during the day, camping in the tents on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

It is anticipated that the Domain will be vacated by 12 noon Monday 16 November, 1992.

I have conveyed to our co-ordinators on the site the requirements we discussed - particularly to protect trees: no climbing! and no banners. No further tent pegs are planned to be driven. Your Mr Hayman could attend and provide advice nonetheless. Mr Aidan Ricketts (Ned) will be on site for liaison as necessary. A mobile phone on loan to us could be used as a point of contact viz: 018 279 081. We will leave the area neat and tidy. All rubbish will be collected.

We have styled the information displays and tents as 'embassies' to represent our concerns and our absent colleagues to Members of the NSW Parliament who are considering the five draconian Natural Resource Bills. Both aboriginal people and environmentalists are involved in the embassy. Many of these people come from the far north coast of NSW known traditionally as the Bundjalung Nation. This co-operation is a 'first' and augurs well for the future.

FIRST CUTTING CYCLE YIELDS

"A complete field assessment of available merchantable timber volume and growing stock has not been undertaken for the Area." (1988, 1.3.2.2)

"Within the whole Area, approx 21% of the SF area carries unlogged hardwood timber stands. Of this, 5% of the total SF area is unsuitable for harvesting through economic or anymonmental constraints, the balance (16%) is suitable for hardwood logging." (1988, 1.4.2.1)

"The overall 1978 Plan strategy for maintaining timber production was to complete the planned logging of generally unlogged stands in the Upriver Forests in the present cutting cycle, and to defer logging of the previously selectively logged Coastal Forests generally until the next cutting cycle to allow maximum development of these stands." (1988, 1.5.2.1)

"Further adjustments in the adopted quote reduction regime shall be made as necessary to conform with the estimated long term sustained yield available in the next cutting cycle." (1988, 2.2.2.1)

"Volume estimates of substantially unlogged areas are based on areas of forest type by expected yields without intensive field investigations." (1988, 1.5.2.1.2)

"A more detailed <u>revision of net unlogged areas available for logging is desirable</u> early in the plan period, including review of areas excluded from logging due to inaccessibility or management restraints." (1988, 1.5.2.1.2)

"Continuation of the review and monitoring will be required for effective implementation of the timber production strategy." (1988, 1.5.2.1.2)

"The bulk of the remaining mature saviog resource is located in less economic areas where low stumpage value is reduced by steep terrain, more expensive road construction and longer snig and log haulage distances. in steeper Upriver forests high road construction and logging costs reduce economic materins." (1988, 1.8.2.1)

"In 1987 the following <u>regime of quota reductions</u> designed to reduce quotes to long term sustainable levels was advised to industry:-

Please extend on our behalf, to all staff at the RBG, and to the members of the Trust, an invitation to come and view the displays, read our information leaflets and meet with environmentalists and aboriginal people from the Bundjalung Nation.

Please allow me to confirm in writing my advice of earlier today. I have spoken to the NSW Police Service: Sgt Graham of The Rocks Police Station (265 6333) who is content with our assurances as to the short term and non-violent nature of our embassies. Sgt Graham may have contacted you already, if not perhaps you could telephone him on the above number.

The NSW Special Branch officers also interviewed me and are fully briefed. They were assured that there would be no attempt to block access to the Parliament House or otherwise interfere with the security of the House. Uniformed and Special Branch Police have my name and contact phone number.

Those staffing the information displays will not interfere with other users of the domain.

As I indicated to you when we spoke, NEFA is a community based organisation with limited resources. We rely wholly on donations, and limited fundraising. We have no paid staff. We were not aware of the likelihood of fees and charges being made for the use of the Domain.

While we would like to meet these fees, because of the drain on our resources being so far from home (far north coast), the costs involved in the production of our displays, and the tremendous costs of our legal actions to date to defend 'old growth' forests, endangered species and wilderness areas at risk, NEFA is unable to do so.

May I make through you, a request to the Trust, for the waiving of any fees or charges that may have otherwise have been incurred, please?

Mr MARTIN: The honourable member is a bigger fool than I thought he was if he knocks unions and people in the industry. The workers of this State have to carry the burdens of the decisions made in this Parliament. The Parliament will decide what is in the best interest of the people of New South Wales. Fifteen pieces of legislation control the timber industry. This has caused confusion and anger. The endangered fauna legislation brought forward by the Labor Party has helped to close down the industry. Twice already the forestry industry has almost closed down. In the present situation there are wider implications. There is a flow-on effect in many industries such as transport, engineering and agriculture. The introduction of the endangered fauna legislation has seriously limited the ability of the Department of Conservation and Land Management to process applications for processes involving tree destruction on protected land because of the need to consider the effect that an activity will have on protected fauna. Officers of CALM have no option but to request expert opinion and information on a range of matters. CALM has a legal obligation to call for a fauna impact statement. But what about the jobs? The loss of jobs on the North Coast in my electorate, the electorate of Myall Lakes and other electorates right through to the Queensland border will be a direct result. The Labor Party has a game plan to mount a cheap political campaign with the Independent greens. However, I must pay full credit to the honourable member for Tamworth for his common sense in supporting the coalition Government on this matter.



STANDARD CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL FOR THE USE OF LANDS CONTROLLED BY THE ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS AND DOMAIN TRUST

- . Vehicles must be parked only in the parking areas provided unless otherwise specifically authorised.
- . When vehicular access is authorised, the Trust disclaims liability for any third party personal injury or property damage claims which may arise from vehicles being driven or transported on its lands.
- Only authorised structures and advertising will be permitted.
- Items must not be attached to trees, buildings or other fixed structures.
- Fireworks and rock bands are not permitted.
- No vending of goods or services or collections of money shall take place without prior approval.
- . Authorised catering services must comply with all statutory health requirements.
- The use of barbecues, other than those provided permanently on-site, needs prior approval. Barbecue residues must be collected in drip trays and portable barbecues must be sufficiently elevated to prevent radiated heat from damaging the grass.
- . Hot water, oil or fat must not be poured on the grass.
- . All litter must be removed or placed in the bins provided.
- Organisers and participants must comply with any request made of them by Royal Botanic Gardens staff prior to, during, and after the activity.
- . Close liaison must be maintained with the Gardens staff over the proposed use of the area concerned.
- . The approval of any other government agency that may be required is the applicant's responsibility.
- . Any damage resulting from an approved activity shall be recompensed by the applicant.
- . A public liability insurance policy to a specified amount indemnifying the Royal Botanic Gardens and Domain Trust and all its employees must be arranged by the applicant. Evidence of this policy must be provided at least three working days before the event.
- A fee may be levied for use of the Trust's lands and facilities. A bond may also be required as security against possible damage and non-compliance with any condition of occupation. Separate scheques, made payable to Royal Botanic Gardens and Domain Trust, will be required at least three working days before the event.
- An application for the use of Trust lands submitted at short notice may incur a penalty loading or be refused.
 - 4 WEEKS PRIOR NOTICE IS REQUIRED.
- In the event of cancellation, a cancellation fee equivalent to the Trust's administrative costs up to the time of notification may be levied. Late cancellations may incur forfeiture of the total fee or 50% thereof, at the discretion of the Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens.
- Should occupation of the site extend beyond the agreed period, or should the function be larger or involve additional structures and servicing, or otherwise vary from the information provided to the Trust, an additional fee may be levied on completion of the function.
- . All Regulations under the Royal Botanic Gardens and Domain Trust Act, 1980 (as amended) must be observed.
- Additional specific conditions may be imposed and will be advised in a separate letter of approval.
