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

# Health Differences Between Married Men and Women: The Contribution of Sex-Role Stereotyping

R. Julian Hafner\*

Compared with married men, married women are nearly twice as likely to suffer from psychiatric disorder, although they have only half the annual mortality rate until about age 75, and their life expectancy is nearly 7 years greater. It is argued that sex-role stereotyping contributes substantially to these major health differences between men and women. Some contemporary social and psychological factors that reinforce sex-role stereotyping are discussed, together with some proposals for countering these.

### INTRODUCTION

In recent years, there has been a greatly increased awareness of women's issues, especially in the area of psychological health and wellbeing. This has been linked with improved funding for resources such as Womens Health Centres. outside the home to be protective of the mental health of married women (Berah, 1983).

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WORKSHOP II: Changes needed in services.

Following the first workshop which examined differences in drug use patterns the resources workshop aimed to examine presently existing and needed services. These resources were discussed in the context of the differences among women which presently exclude many women from using services. The differences which all workshop groups believed need greater recognition and inclusion were : aboriginality, cultural differences, language barriers, accommodation for children, lifestyle differences of particular groups e.g. women in prison, prostitutes, lesbians and transexuals.

### 6.1 SUMMARY:

Fifteen groups included the following recommendations and observations.

. Resources are not adequate (every group concluded this).

- Need for a womens detoxification centre.
- Self help is essential services need to be controlled by women using the service - aboriginal ex-addicts, migrant ex-addicts. All need to be women.
- Services need to provide childcare.
- Need for half-way housing, sequence of transition stages of accommodation, employment etc.
- Specific need for services for women leaving prison and returning to the community with dependency problems.
- . Specific need for services for aboriginal women with children.
- Specific need for services for migrant women with children with fully adequate interpreting available.
- Specific need for support to women who are users of prescribed drugs.
- Need for interpreters in these services who have adequate communication skills and education in the area - more than simply language.
- . Specific need for services for prostitutes which is controlled by prostitutes.
- All of us working in this area need to examine our attitudes what is our interest in all of this?
- Need for short term rehabilitation program for women with children providing childrens accommodation.

2. Other clinicians assume that the disordered, deviant communicative behavior of the people intimate with the problem person causes the bizarre behavior and thought processes. Their therapeutic endeavor is therefore to clarify and change communication among intimates in the family.

3. Still other clinicians assume that the problem is a malfunctioning and deviant organization. That organization requires peculiar communicative behavior and therefore peculiar thought processes.

It is the argument of this work that the most effective therapeutic intervention is directed at the basic organizational structure. As that changes, so do other factors. In fact, if one thinks in organizational terms, a therapist cannot avoid being part of the family organization. As a therapist talks to a young person about his thought processes, he is an outsider dealing with a family member, and the organization has rules for dealing with outsiders. If he clarifies family communication, by that act he has become an authority in the family hierarchy. To overlook the organizational situation can lead to naïve interventions which prevent change or even make matters worse. In fact, families will make use of a naïve clinician to stabilize and avoid change.

The importance of the social situation has been overlooked in the clinical field for a number of reasons. For centuries, individual character and personality had been emphasized; the scientific task was to classify individuals, not social situations, into types. In addition, cultural institutions are based on the idea of the individual as the unit of responsibility. To allow the social situation to be causal would lead to the jailing or hospitalization of families and friends rather than individuals. Many facets of the culture depend on the fact, or myth, of the individual as a unit.

Until the concept of systems, there was no adequate theory of social situations. To describe behavior which keeps repeating, and so forms an organizational structure of habitual responses, is a new way of thinking about people. The concept of a self-correcting system of relationships is difficult for many people to grasp, much less to take for granted. It is easier to say a particular person caused a difficulty than it is to think of the difficulty as one step in a repeating cycle in which everyone participates.

Another problem in accepting the social situation as a unit is the simple idea that people live in social situations, and so they take them for granted. Ordinary situations, like stages of family life, seemed so obvious that they were not considered a subject of scientific concern. Everyone knew there was a family life-stage when young people leave home, but it was not thought important, so no one noticed the conjunction of malfunctioning people and that life-stage. It is now appearing that, in any organization, the time of greatest change occurs when someone is entering the organization or leaving it.

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# Comments please Teler Regarde FAX TO ECHO LISMORE FROM SIMON CLOUGH THE MOCONTRIBUTION

There are a growing number of local multiple occupancy [MO] communities that have been in existence for over 20 years. Perhaps it's time to look at some of the achievements of the MO movement.

One of the main and continuing aims of MO has been to provide low cost housing in rural areas. I know of a MO where a member built his 2 bedroom home out of mainly new materials for less than \$25,000. Another couple on the same community built an exquisite home out of mud bricks and recycled materials for around \$12,000.

MO members have been responsible for a lot of low cost innovation such as development of sand sawdust and cement as a material for wall infill and very creative use of mud brick and rammed earth. Many of these innovations were assisted by a book put together locally called "Low Cost Country Home Building".

Perhaps the main contribution that MO has made to housing is in the relatively new area of what is called social housing. Put simply this is the concept that physical housing is only part of the story and that the social and physical environment of the housing is also highly important. MO communities have been designed and operate on this understanding since their inception.

The environment is another field in which MOs have made a substantial practical contribution. There are many homes on MOs that are not dependent on water borne systems to take care of their excrement. These are practical safe composting systems that have been operating effectively for years. They have no harmful effect on waterways as do septic and some sewerage systems. In fact you can use the compost form your toilet as a very effective compost for your trees. One MO member I'm aware of has distributed on request more than 600 copies of a low cost highly effective composting toilet plan.

Alternative energy is another area where MOs have taken the lead, installing a wide variety of alternative energy systems. Hydro, solar, wind and trickle systems from the main grid, are all to be found powering homes on MO communities.

Some MOs have made significant contributions in the field of agriculture whether it be in the adaptation of organic farming to this area or the development of new agricultural systems such as Permaculture and Bio-dynamics. Today these farming techniques are being more widely accepted by the general farming community because of the many problems of chemically dependent agriculture.

Communal living has helped create many new skills in people living together. These are skills of co-operating, mediating and resolving conflict. These skills are now moving out into the wider a community as people become more disillusioned with the adversary nature of the legal system and of so many other aspects of our society.

It would not be possible to have even a brief look at MO achievements without mentioning the contribution that many MO people have made to the arts. These contributions are in music, drama and visual arts.

MOs have contributed significantly to tourism in this area both through the artistic talents I just mentioned and through enterprises like the nationally famous Channon Craft Market, which began on a MO. People from MOs are of course involved in all manner of jobs and business that they own.

These are just some of the special contributions that MO members make to our larger community. I think it is fair to say that MOs are a integral part of the North Coast scene and that they have in many fields lead the way to a life style that is more co-operative, environmentally friendly and certainly more colourful.





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

## **RE: COUNCIL'S REVIEW OF MULTIPLE OCCUPANCY**

1. Please find enclosed copy of Development Control Plan No. 20 - Multiple Occupancy of Rural Lands adopted by Council at its meeting held April 19, 1994. Notice in accordance with Clause 24(2) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation was made in the Northern Star of May 7, 1994. The Plan is now in effect.

Council's Planning Services Division wishes to thank Pan-Community and in particular Mr Peter Hamilton for assistance and advice in the preparation of the Plan.

2. As part of the on-going process of post development review throughout the local government area, Council proposes to shortly commence an inspection of existing Council and State Government approved multiple occupancies.

This process will involve on-site inspections of the respective properties and assessment of existing development in terms of compliance with any development consents issued in accordance with the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act. On-site inspections and discussions will provide an opportunity for review of the appropriateness of the conditions. Where developments have not complied with development consent, they will be invited to negotiate the respective conditions with a view of mutual agreement and/or submit an application to formalise the situation.

Another outcome of this "hands-on" exercise is to establish contact names and telephone numbers of key person/s for Council-to communities for purpose of emergency service provision and advance warning eg, bushfire.

Council, at this stage, also sees this as an opportunity to distribute Council's survey of multiple occupancies and residents in multiple occupancies. As previously indicated it is proposed this will utilize the report and survey undertaken for Council in 1985 by S Barker and S Knox. Under separate cover Council will shortly forward copy of the survey to you for comment prior to commencement.

Council also proposes to make contact and survey owners of land adjoining multiple occupancies in an attempt to quantify the issues of "conflict with adjoining land uses".


3. Council is also writing to all approved multiple occupancies advising them of the post approval assessment process. This notice will further describe matters mentioned in Item 2 above and will suggest preferred times for the inspections.

Council staff are prepared to attend a meeting/s with Pan-Community and representatives of its membership communities to further discuss the matters raised above.

I am writing to advise your community of two matters:-

1. Council has now adopted a Development Control Plan No. 20 - Multiple Occupancy of Rural Lands. This plan specifies Council requirements in respect of <u>new</u> multiple occupancy developments. It is envisaged that the plan will bring a greater degree of certainty and mutual understanding of Council's and other statutory authorities' requirements in the development control process and provide assistance to individuals and groups wishing to make development applications for multiple occupancy use of land.

Council wishes to thank those communities and members who have made contributions to the review and consultation process which was an integral part of the creation of the plan.

2. As part of the process of on-going review of <u>all</u> development consents issued by Council, it is proposed to shortly commence a process of on-site inspections of all Council and State Government approved multiple occupancies. This process will also involve checking compliance with development consents issued. It is anticipated this assessment will address matters such as water supply, effluent disposal, fire protection area, payment of levies, access provision, location and number of dwellings, building approvals and any other matters addressed in the issued consent.

On-site inspections and discussion will provide an opportunity for review of the appropriateness of conditions imposed by Council.

Council also wishes to use this "hands on" exercise as a means of establishing contact with communities (names of key persons and telephone numbers) for purposes of emergency service provision and advance warning eg, bushfire control and protection.

At this stage it is expected that a Council survey will be distributed to communities during this review process. The survey will utilise that information previously used in the compilation of the report titled "Findings of a Survey of Attitudes of the Dwellers of Multiple Occupancies" by Sue Barker and Stephanie Knox, 1985. Council believes that this report will form a basis ie, bench mark, from which Council can make a comparative assessment of the growth, development and characteristics of multiple occupancy in the City. - 2 -

Please treat this notice as advance notice. Council's Planning Services Division will shortly contact your community again to arrange a suitable time for on-site inspections. To facilitate this process Council again requests that it be advised of the person and telephone number with whom Council staff can liaise.
