> In fact, in its rejection of the proposal by Apex and Alstonville Agricultural Society to erect the pavilion council has opened a "Pandora's Box" of issues, all of which go to the heart of the efficiency and effectiveness of the administration of the Shire.

> A spokesman for Alstonville Apex Club said Council's role in these areas is to lay down the relevant planning instruments or Local Environment Plan (LEP) and then to abide by and enforce the LEP subject to community opinion.


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

Community opinion in this instance comprised a vocal minority of 21 residents versus 2 community groups, the Alstonville Agricultural Society and the Alstonville Apex Club.

"A wet weather venue is urgently required at the Showground, particularly between the months of January and May.

"The Showground is zoned open space 6(a) under the provisions of the Ballina Local Environment Plan, 1987 and the proposed erection and uses of the building are permissible with Council consent."

The Chief Town Planner in his report to Council reported that the additional facilities would provide Alstonville with significantly enhanced opportunities for a range of exhibition, sporting and cultural activities and that, on balance, the disadvantages of the proposal were outweighed by the community benefits.

The spokesman said, however, many objections to the pavilion at Alstonville were not based on community benefit but self interest, hypothetical property values and perceived reduction in the amenity of the area.

"In this instance the objections were thinly veiled and related to the aesthetics of the building, the potential for vandalism and traffic. All of the issues were covered by the Chief Town Planner in his report to Council, Integration to the community centre, landscaping and building set-back.

"One can not escape the fact that the erection of an agricultural pavilion is a legitimate activity in an Agricultural Showground and this must have been known to local residents when they purchased property."

He said the most insidious form of objection came from people not directly affected by the proposal. "These people miss the point entirely, firstly that this is not a government spending program to cater to lobby groups. Secondly, if they required some special type of community facility they themselves should be involved in it's provision rather than expecting the Agricultural Society and Apex to provide it for them."

The spokesman said if the community no longer required the provision of facilities such as Pre-Schools, Community Centres, Safety-house signs etc., then the Apex Association could afford to take a break and step back. "After all there must be more enjoyable ways for young family men to spend their week-ends other than selling raffle tickets, building play-grounds and providing free man-power for charity fetes.

"It is the Alstonville Agricultural Society which is most adversely affected by the Council's refusal of the project. Since 1818 the committee has been striving to fund the Showground facility. That is 102 years of cake stalls, growing potato crops and working bees to maintain and improve the showground only to find this happen."

No Fast **Tracking** on

Bananas

Damage done to banana plantations in Queensland will not lead to any fast-track-Ing of banana import applications in order to meet possible shortfalls in production during the next six months, the Federal Member Richmond, Neville Newell has warned.

Mr Newell was commenting on reports from banana growers about the extent of damage to crops in Queensland caused by tropical cyclone Joy.

Mr Newell said that some growers had expressed fear that pressure could be applied on Government to 'fast-track' applications for import licenses in order to take advantage of shortterm market needs.

"I sympathise with those whose crops have been devastated by the cyclone, and the personal losses they have sustained.

However, the procedures for treating applications for banana imports have not changed.

The Minister, John Kerin, has made it abundantly clear over and over again that those procedures will be adhered to.

That being the case, there will be no fast-tracking of applications, if they are lodged."

Mr Newell said he was not aware if any new applications had been made at this stage. .
