#### Greetings and welcome!

It is with excitement and enthusiasm that we bring you this first issue. FORSPA, an acronym for Forestry Research Support Program for the Asia-Pacific, represents a concept. It is an idea embodying cooperative forestry research with a future vision and ensuing transfer of technology from the realm of the researcher to the terrain of the field worker.

The concerned international agencies have set a tone by their collaborative venture. The Food & Agriculture Organization [FAO] is coordinating this program. The Asian Development Bank [ADB] and the United Nations Development Program [UNDP] are providing the vital finances. C.A.B International [CABI] is implementing the information constituent -- the kingpin of any research or decision-making process.

FORSPA aims to achieve a part of what the new Center for International Forestry Research [CIFOR] will be attempting at an international level. A breakthrough in the process of implementing regionally relevant collaborative strategic research may, at present, be a small step for FORSPA, but it is in the right direction and it has an immense potential. The Asia-Pacific is an exemplary region to initiate this creative undertaking. It is unique not only because it contains a quarter of the world's tropical forest resources, but it is also the only region to have an FAO Standing Committee on Forestry Research.

What is FORSPA's mission? Our view and initial approach to its implementation are outlined in this issue. We will regularly bring you information on research results, forestry policies, new projects, and of course; on our activities. However, a project such as FORSPA cannot exist in isolation without any feedback from its readers. We would very much like to hear from you. Please tell us your views about FORSPA's strategic goals. How can we achieve them effectively and efficiently? We are waiting to hear from you.







# FORSPA: A Need for Commitment

Just when we are comfortable about our knowledge of nature and natural forces, along come humbling unexpected events. Mount Pinatubo's eruption and the eventuality of global cooling manifests two important lessons. Principally, we cannot take nature for granted and, secondarily, natural influences anywhere in the world have global implications.

The eruption of El Chichon, a Mexican volcano, in 1982 had worldwide effects. The average surface temperatures dropped by approximately 0.1-0.3 of a degree centigrade. More recently, the haze spreading through Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, Brunei, and southern Thailand was the result of forest fires in Kalimantan and forest clearings in Northern Sumatra.

The land we have is held in trust for our children. The concern about its sustainable utilization-consequently extends to the entire international community. The forests are inseparable from the land and therefore from humankind. Talking about any one of them in isolation is meaningless.


FAO estimates that 17 million hectares of forest, out of a total global forest area of approximately four billion hectares, are disappearing annually. The causes are numerous and, at times, imperceptible from the effects. The forest loss is translating into increased desertification, declining tropical rainforests, and increasing poverty, to name a few scourges. Never has the linkage of forests to mankind been so clearly felt and never has it been considered under a greater threat.

However, the threat is not yet a siege. A new awareness is apparent. New

ideas, new concepts, and new attitudes are germinating. The message of synergetic existence, which nature has been persistently giving us, is finally being put into practice. It is manifesting itself in increasing international, social, and economic integration.


The choice of theme for the recently concluded 10th World Forestry Congress hosted by France from September 17 to 26, 1991, viz "Forests, A Heritage for the Future," supports this conviction. It emphasizes a dual commitment from us: a fundamental obligation to foster international cooperation to protect this threatened resource and a promise to pass it on, with our positive contributions, to future generations.

FORSPA is a symbol of our commitment. It is a new and an innovative project to develop a Forestry Research Network for the Asia-Pacific region. We hope that it will assist in focusing the attention of foresters, policy makers, donors, and the international community in building up adequate facilities and an environment to improve the capacity, capability, and productivity of forestry research institutions.



# INFORM'S Efforts Result in FORSPA

Strengthening of national forestry research capabilities in the region is a top priority of the FAO Regional Office for Asia & the Pacific [RAPA] in Bangkok. Among the recent initiatives, an Expert Consultation of the Forestry Research Directors was held at RAPA, Bangkok from August



22-25, 1989 and INFORM resulted.

INFORM...Informal Network of Forestry Research Managers of the Asia-Pacific Region conceptualised and recommended the formation of FORSPA. ADB and UNDP, acknowledging the merit of the project, promised funding support. Although FORSPA was conceived then, it took persistent effort by all members and institutions over the interim years for the idea to manifest itself in the present form.

# Agreements Formalized

ADB signed two separate agreements. Besides a Technical Assistance Agreement with FAO for implementation of FORSPA, a separate three-year pact for strengthening the information component of the project was signed with CAB International [CABI]. It shows the importance attached by ADB to access to scientific and technical information for strengthening national forestry research in the region. CABI has been disseminating information in support of forestry for over 50 years. It will fulfill its commitments under the guidance of the FORSPA Advisory Group and FAO.

The FORSPA Advisory Group consists of ten members: five members drawn from the Developing Member Countries as agreed between ADB and FAO, and one representative each from ADB, CABI, FAO, International Union of Forestry Research Organizations [IUFRO], and UNDP.

# Implementation of FORSPA

The primary objective of FORSPA is to stengthen national forestry research in the Asia-Pacific region. FORSPA wishes to work very closely with all the existing forestry networks and the donor agencies. Periodic seminars and workshops on selected topics will be organized with the assistance of UNDP and ADB to which all concerned participants will be invited. This will ensure a complementarity in the research effort by researchers, donors, and networks. Furthermore, a collaborative research effort in the region will assure long-term sustainability of FORSPA.


As a starting point FORSPA therefore proposes to:

- identify major forestry research problems of common concern in the region.
- formulate, fund, and implement appropriate research projects to resolve these issues.
- develop, promote, and sustain closer interaction among the participating research institutions and with their international counterparts.
- assist in the preparation and dissemination of research information.

#### CABI's Role

The last objective defines the terms of reference for CABI. CABI, under the guidance of the FORSPA Advisory Group, will attempt to strengthen forestry research information capabilities in the region by:

- providing access and training to the participating institutions in the use of forestry bibliographic databases.
- preparing an inventory of unpublished data and research findings by collating information from disparate



sources. This information will then be disseminated to different categories of users through monographs.

- repackaging appropriate research findings for easy access by policy makers, legislators, and rural administrators.
- Publish a quarterly newsletter.

In improving regional information capabilities, CABI will provide Forestry Abstracts for the three year period (1991-93) to twenty selected forestry research institutes in the Asia-Pacific region. The selected institutes will be notified individually.

Additionally, CD-ROM facilities with the required hardsoftware, ware, TREECD (see box) will be installed at ten selected research institutions in the region. Comprehensive training, covering such areas as computer hardware and software, CD-ROM technology, setting up a CD-ROM work station, searching TREECD, etc., will also be provided to representatives of the institutions receiving this facility.

# FORSPA Developments: The Advisory Group Meets

The Advisory Group, chaired by Dr. Salleh Mohamed Nor, met for the first time on 5-6 September, 1991 in Bangkok. Dr. Y.S. Rao, Regional Forestry Officer, RAPA, was unanimously chosen as the first FORSPA programme advisor for an initial period of three years.

The Group affirmed that FORSPA will strive to embrace all aspects of forestry research including education and extension. It will make an effort to prepare "Handbooks for Field Workers" in local languages to enable the transfer of technology from the laboratory to the field. Special attention will be directed to meet the forestry research needs of South Pacific countries.

The success of FORSPA is contingent on the participating governments. Their direct support for the regional programme is equal in importance to their policy level assistance for forestry research and extension in their respective individual countries.

The involvement of developed countries in the region can be an important link in building appropriate structures for promoting forestry research. FORSPA will consequently seek the participation of these nations both as potential donors and as beneficiaries of regional cooperation.

# Document Delivery



# TREECD: New CAB SPECTRUM Compact Disc

A pilot issue of CABI's Forestry CD-ROM, called the TREECD, was demonstrated at the tenth International Forestry Congress in September 1991. It is soon to be marketed by CABI. It will be an answer to the prayers of researchers in forestry and allied fields. TREECD contains all of the bibliographic citations and abstracts published in Forestry Abstracts from 1939 to 1990. Additionally, it includes all of the Forest Product Abstracts and Agroforestry Abstracts from their respective beginnings in 1978 and 1988. 300,000 abstracts for the fifty year period - what more could one ask for!! For more information, contact the editor.

# Collaborative Forestry Research Projects: Call for Proposals

The FORSPA secretariat has invited proposals from all forest research institutes, universities, and other institutions engaged in forestry and related research, in the region. The following five areas have been designated as priorities for research.



# Upland Watershed Management

The proposals should focus on sustainable land-use options which integrate forestry, agriculture, and energy related interventions. Alternatives which will enable upland dwellers to maximize land productivity on a sustained basis and simultaneously minimize erosion and downstream da-mage need to be explored.

FORSPA is emphasizing subjects related to systems approaches in studying interlinkages between upstream and downstream activities, improved techniques and management of shifting cultivation, and economics of watershed management -- particularly the valuation of externalities and social costs pertaining to this ecosystem.

# Reforestation of Degraded Lands Problem Soils

The selected proposals will bear on effective strategies and techniques for improved productivity of degraded lands and problem soils. FORSPA stresses biotechnology research to develop, introduce, and manage plant species adapted to impaired lands, bad-lands, and soils. FORSPA also wishes to encourage research on topics related to management of common property regimes, policy reforms, and socioeconomic changes essential to promote and adopt suitable technologies to make these lands productive.

# Conservation of Ecosystems & Biological Diversity Maintenance

FORSPA is keen to fund project proposals relating to conservation of tropical forestry ecosystems. The topics may vary from an economic analysis of conservation, timber pricing, techniques and strategies of buffer zone management, to policies of nonwood forest products, land tenure, agriculture settlement, and industrial development.

# Improving the Sustainability of Plantation Forestry

Much research is required to examine the sustainability of intensive plantation forestry. FORSPA wishes to promote topics studying the potential contribution of plantation forestry in conserving natural forests and in fostering national development. Related topics may address questions of species-site specificity, ecology and monoculture, and rapid propagation of commercially valuable species.

FORSPA also emphasizes research on lesser known species. The topics include issues of new technologies,

wood engineering, and wood preservation.

Finally, the national policy options and incentives, and financial mechanisms affecting the plantation forests are considered an imperative for research in the area.

# Promotion of Community Participation in Forestry Development

Research issues pertaining to land tenure policies are as important as the study of incentives and mechanisms for securing community participation in forestry.

Priority is also accorded to subjects concerning national government policies, and the role of private sector and institutions in stimulating community action for tree growing and nature conservation.

# Criteria for Selecting Projects for Funding

FORSPA, per se, is fostering regional cooperative research. Consequently, "task forces" consisting of specialists drawn from the participating research institutes in each of the above areas will scrutinize and evaluate the proposals carefully.

The FORSPA secretariat has received nominations of distinguished scientists from different research institutes in the region.

The project briefs will be reviewed at the next meeting of the FORSPA Advisory Group on 23 January 1992. Evaluations of the proposals will be partly based on:

- nature of the shared problems
- common features of research methodology to be used
- mechanics for sustaining interaction [regional, national, etc] amongst cooperating researchers
- monitoring mechanisms

### FORSPA SECRETARIAT

A secretariat has been established in the FAO Regional office for Asia and the Pacific, Bangkok. It is headed by Dr. Y.S. Rao, the first Program Advisor. He is assisted by Ms. Julia Roetzer, Associate Professional Officer [APO]. We eagerly await the joining of another APO.

# FORSPA Logo?

FAO Regional Office and the Asia Regional Office of CAB International sponsored a contest in Bangkok and Kuala Lumpur respectively for the FORSPA logo with a prize of US\$ 400. 18 entries have been received. All of the entries are commendable and the final choice will be difficult. The FORSPA Advisory Group will decide the winning logo during the January 1992 meeting in Kuala Lumpur. The selected logo will be displayed on the front page of subsequent newsletters. We are very grateful to all the participants for their time and effort.


The participants will provide guidelines for the FORSPA secretariat on implementation procedures for funding research proposals, disseminating information in the region, and for conducting

# Directory of Forestry Research Professionals in Asia-Pacific

FAO Regional Office is preparing a computerized database of forest research professionals and research managers in the Asia-Pacific region.

About 1500 questionnaires were mailed to different forestry research institutions in



the entire region. The information requested pertained, inter alia, to the nature of current research, important publications, languages spoken, area of expertise, and specialization. So far, 772 researchers from 78 different institutions have replied.

## Grey Literature?

The entire collection of reference material in the. Forestry section of FAO Regional Office is being organized as a bibliographic database. About 1000 references have already been catalogued.

Procedures are being worked out to make this literature accessible to the researchers. Dissemination through Mongraphs is an effective option. Other suggestions are invited.

# Asian Forest Plantation Pest Management

Although pest management is an important element of tropical forestry development, it has been underemphasized and underresourced. Lately, the appearance of new pests in Asian forestry, both exotic and from local habitats, has reiterated an increased need

for forestry pest management expertise. Such a need has also been higlighted at the IUFRO/FAO Regional Office sponsored meeting on Pest and Diseases of Forest Plantations in the Asia-Pacific Region.

In order to seek effective sustainable management procedures for tackling the problem of forest pests and to explore the potential of regional cooperation on the issue, FAO Regional Office has signed a special services agreement with CABI. CABI will carry out a comprehensive literature review and document the present status of forest exotic plantation pest management in the region.

CABI's Dr. Roger Day, who has extensive experience in pest management in the region, visited the forestry research institutes in India, Malaysia, Philippines, and Sri Lanka. Two different CABI country survey teams have collected similar information in Indonesia and Thailand respectively.

A report on the present activities in pest management, the existing strength of staffing and resources, economic damage caused by pests, additional resources required, and the potential to realize these needs through international coordination of research will soon be submitted by CABI. Furthermore, the report will prioritize pests and needs with respect to

their identification, assessment, control and recommendations for strengthening of national programs. We will keep you posted.

## Congrats! Dr. Salleh

Datuk Dr. Salleh Mohamed Nor, Director General of Forest Research Institute, Malaysia has added another feather to his cap. He was recently awarded the Langkawi Award by the Malaysian government for his outstanding contribution to the environment.

In August 1991, he was awarded the *Third World Network of Scientific Organizations Award* for his exceptional achievements in the field of science.

### International Forestry Research Institute Renamed

Center for International Forestry Research [CIFOR] was selected as the new name for the international organization undertaking forestry research within the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research [CGIAR].

CIFOR emerged as the final choice in a competition held at the International Centers' week in October 1991. Its selection was based on euphony, no implied restrictions in the operation of the international organization, and clarity. Other suggested acronyms varied from CIN-FUL to ISREF.

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

The Forestry Commission has failed to face up to the coming crisis and they are hoping that the old growth forests will tide them over until the re-growth forests are ready. Already the Forestry Commission has admitted that the old growth forest they had cut on the Bulga contained less timber than they calculated. If more of their calculations are wrong then the loss of timber and jobs will occur faster than they have bargained for. In any case hard wood from native forests is being steadily supplemented by plantation timbers and that is the way it should have gone years ago.

So before you mutter about the "unwashed rent-a-crowd" of protesters chaining themselves to bull dozers who appear on your TV screen just ask what you are doing to make Governments keep to their promise of saving old growth forests. You can help with letters to the Premier , donations to Green Appeal , telling your friends about the real situation or even turning up at a blockade.



Re: Your Letters to Premier Carr and Ministers Yeadon headed National Park Proposals and Aboriginal Land Claims in the Sydney Region.

I received copies of your carefully written letters, dated 18 December, just before Christmas with considerable surprise. Particularly so because I had previously raised with you my concern about your earlier letter to Minister Yeadon dated 10 August, and about which I had had no knowledge when an NPA delegation met with him only a few days later on a range of matters.

Furthermore, as you know, a process was set up at NPA's November Council meeting to consider the implications of the Otford Declaration, the outcome of our 1994 conference organised jointly with the NSW Land Council with assistance from a National Estate Programme grant. A Working Party was established, convened by Tom Fink as my nominee, with up to two representatives of our four State Council Committees (Park Management, Reserves, Biodiversity and Young NPA), to report back with recommendations on action to State Council after consideration of the issues involved and any submissions received from members and Branches.

The points made in your correspondence would have been appropriately submitted to Tom Fink for consideration of this working party, expressing as they do your personal understanding and perspective of both specific and more general issues. I am therefore forwarding a copy to Tom Fink.

I am providing Helen Latham as the Sydney Branch Hon Secretary, with a copy of your correspondence, so that the Branch can be made aware of the situation.

I am also writing to the Premier and Ministers Yeadon and Allen to advise them that your correspondence should be read as an expression of your personal views, since there is a process in train within the Association to address the issues of national park estate and aboriginal land claims on behalf of the Association.



### FINAL GO-AHEAD FOR NORTH KIAMA BYPASS

The Minister for Urban Affairs and Planning, Craig Knowles, today announced that he had given the final go-ahead for the North Kiama Bypass.

Mr Knowles' approval enables the Roads and Traffic Authority (RTA) to determine the bypass. This will remove all planning approval barriers and the RTA will be able to program construction of the road.

In 1996 a Commission Of Inquiry found that the road could proceed on the preferred route and recommended conditions to manage the environmental impacts, including those on the Minnamurra Wetlands. Mr Knowles then approved those parts of the road which are covered by Part 4 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979.

"The selected route as finally approved provides the best balance between the key environmental issues of impacts on the wetlands, the agricultural and scenic attributes of the Jamberoo Valley and the community," Mr Knowles said.

"In keeping with the COI's conditions of approval, the Roads and Traffic Authority will prepare an Environmental Management Plan to guide the detailed design, construction and monitoring of all aspects of the road's development and operation.

"The road will entirely bridge the Minnamurra River floodplain and wetlands. To compensate for this minimal disturbance 10 hectares of land will be regenerated as wetland, with similar vegetation.

"Water quality control measures will treat all construction and road run-off waters and direct their release away from the wetlands.

"The road design is better than that required to accommodate known and expected flooding in the Minnamurra River.

"It allows for the continued operation of agricultural enterprises and minimises the impact on prime crop and pasture land.

"Other conditions of approval include noise attenuation and landscaping," Mr Knowles said.

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

#### **ASSESSMENT**

The six nominees vary from large groups to small from long time members to new and from long campaigns to relatively short. The groups vary in location from north to south to inland. Some have already achieved success (albeit temporary). Some continue to fight.

The campaigns cover coastal development, wetlands, mining and toxic chemicals.

Therefore the task for the adjudicators has been difficult.

It was decided to reward a new member group for their enthusiasm and for the ramifications of their success and so the first winner of the TOGA award for 1997 is The Scotts Head Protection group.

#### **CAMDEN HAVEN PROTECTION SOCIETY**

Long time member of NCEC with the largest membership of any NCEC group.

This group has fought a long battle to save a wetland from becoming the Dunbogan canal estate.

This long campaign has included energetic fundraising to obtain the expertise to put the conservation side at two Commissions of Enquiry with great success.

#### **CONSERVATION OF NORTH OCEAN SHORES (CONOS)**

A long time member with a small membership base who have waged a battle to save a coastal area from inappropriate development.

This area was first brought to our attention by the Byron Environment and Conservation (BEACON) group in 1983 when the Bond Corporation owned it.

A conservation order was placed over part of the land and the State Government bought a large part of the area in 1995 for a Nature Reserve.

Clearing by the developer in an important wildlife corridor keeps the group fighting as well as a Commission of Enquiry held last week.

#### SCOTTS HEAD PROTECTION GROUP

New member group formed to stop an inappropriate development adjacent to a proposed Nature Reserve and situated between coastal dunes and wetlands.

Direct action and legal action have been used as well as energetic fundraising to meet legal costs.

The case was won and has established a bench mark for Local government as consent authorities.

The judge found that Nambucca Shire Council failed to act as a responsible

consent authority creating six breaches of the EP & A Act including not requiring a Species Impact Statement.



New members of NCEC from over the Dividing Range who are fighting to save a high conservation area from a gold mining development.

The State Government seems committed to allowing the mine to proceed despite the obvious environmental concerns. Direct action and legal action are continuing.

#### **TOXIN ACTION GROUP (TAG)**

A longtime member whose expertise voices the communities' concern over chemical misuse on the North Coast. TAG exposed the problems of cattle dip sites on the North Coast NSW.

There members represent NCEC on the National Registration Consultative Committee on Toxic chemicals and also the National Pollutant Inventory Committee.

They have campaigned over the problems of aerial spraying particularly near schools or schoolchildren waiting for school busses.

They have also produced a leaflet warning of the dangers of chemical cleaning agents used in schools.

#### FORESTRY

The reports of the RAC and the PAC have been very critical of the Forestry Commissions management of the State Forests but the Government seems to be taking no action to right the wrongs. In fact their actions following Chaelundi are quite the reverse. There is need to look at the whole of the timbered areas of the North Coast , collect data and then see what role each part will play in the role of protecting endangered species, of providing for a sawlog industry , of giving the scenic backdrop of the tourist industry , of protecting catchments. There needs to be emphasis on trees on farms ( see Australian Farm Journal Jan 1992 which shows how far NSW is behind and how better technology is solving problems of sawing )

#### LEGAL AID

The cutting of funds from the Legal Aid Commission, the alteration of membership and other measures is reducing the possibility of the community combatting ill considered development by developers, Local Government and Government departments. Though it has not been possible to obtain statistics we know of few cases were the community group has lost and in most cases society has been saved from costly ill considered schemes. It would be of interest to know how much the community has been saved by community action with legal aid.



#### GUARANTEEING THE ABC'S FUTURE

The base funding of the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) would be guaranteed and made inflation-proof for the next three years under proposals in discussion papers I have released today.

The papers propose the three year funding guarantee in order to provide a stable "no-cuts" period for the Government, the ABC and the community generally to reassess the role and objectives of Australia's major national broadcaster - and if necessary to reshape the ABC and its legislative Charter to enable it to better cope with a rapidly changing communications environment.

The discussion pares are not an attempt to in any way reduce the significance of the role that national broadcasting plays in Australian daily life. The Government remains firmly committed to maintaining a vibrant, strong, relevant and fearlessly independent ABC.

No final decisions on the ABC's future will be taken until after a period of wide ranging consultation and public debate.

Fundamental to any change to the ABC is the need to rethink its present legislative Charter, which is now a mish-mash of mutually inconsistent generalities giving no clear guidance to the ABC as to what it should be seeking to achieve.

The major points of the discussion paper proposals include:

Detailed analysis of what new Charter objectives for the ABC might look like - focusing on principles of quality, diversity and national identity - and a discussion of how these might be translated (using ABT program categories for rough illustrative purposes) into indicative program priorities.

The Secretary's letter was discussed at Beacon's meeting on 6/2/92; 25 members were present. The meeting agreed that the matter was particularly As the reputation and credibility of the Council, its member groups and their representatives would be at stake, it had to be approached with great caution and required full involvement of the executive in all The following resolution was passed. decisions.

Moved Peter Hamilton, seconded Paul Brecht that Beacon support the proposal by NCEC to take legal action against the Commonwealth on the issue of woodchip licences. Support is contingent on legal advice that there is a better than 50% chance of success. In view of the cost, time and the risks for the Conservation Movement on the North Coast and the possibility that the Council will be opposed by major industry as well as the Government, court action should be seen as the last recourse. Therefore, advice should also be sought on the opportunities for mediation and negotiation using legal representatives. Also, all opportunities for finding an alternative principal with court standing must be exhausted.

Beacon considers that the case must be run by the Council's Executive and that all public statements and press releases must be approved by the Executive and preferably made by the President.

Beacon also requests copies (or wishes to view) the legal advice received by the Council.
