New network formed to protect the environment

The Community Legal Environmental Action Network (CLEAN) is a newly formed group under the wing of the Northern Rivers Community Legal centre in Lismore. CLEAN aims to establish an environmental legal service, similar to the Environmental Defender's Office, for the North Coast.

CLEAN has issued a press release encouraging the community to participate in and become aware of the changes to the Environment Planning and Assessment Act which came into effect on July 1. Spokesperson Georgia Rayner said that under the old Act there were 27 matters listed under s90, which the consent authority had to consider when assessing a development application. Under the new Act these have been condensed to five general matters.

'We are particularly concerned that the narrowing of these matters results in an unclear checklist for consent authorities. The generic nature of these new heads of consideration will in effect result in less information about specific issues of a development being made available for public comment. The Byron Shire Council, for instance, is developing their own internal guidelines about how these generic heads of consideration will be assessed. It seems much fairer and reasonable for both developers applying for or members of the public wanting to comment on development applications that the process of assessment be transparent,' Ms Rayner said.

'We encourage people to request that their councils provide brochures detailing the new consent processes, assessment procedures and means of public comment. This will ensure that people are aware of the actions to be taken if they wish to comment on a development'

As part of the changes local councils will have to prepare Local Environment Plans (LEPs) for new categories of

development, exempt development and complying development. Exempt developments are developments that may commence without consent from council. Complying developments can be certified either by council or a private accreditor. Complying developments don't require notification to neighbours, unless it is specified in a Development Control Plan (DCP). Appeals are severely limited.

'Byron and Lismore Councils indicate that they are eager for a high degree of community input into these LEPs. Commenting on the contents of the LEPs is an important avenue for community, participation in the planning process and future of your area. It is important that the community be proactive in the planning process and support the councils,' Ms Rayner said.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Rural Lands*Protection Board was established well over 100 years ago to deal with disease in sheep that were first imported into Australia. Until recently the board was known as 'The Pasteur Protection

Today, The Tweed-Lismore Rural Lands Protection Board's function is the services of:

- A Noxious Animal Inspector to identify noxious animals i.e. Pigs, rabbits, feral dogs
- A Vetinerian to identify disease in large herds of cattle and
- A Ranger who's job is to issue ear tags at the cattle auctions.

80% of land-holder's are minimum rate-payers and many do not require these services. Animal Inspector could be absorbed into the Agriculture Dept. eliminating huge administration costs.

Therefore, the majority of rate-payers receive absolutely no benefits from this board. The board is taking money under false pretences by operating under a mis-leading title.

Land-holders pay a rate on the estimated stock carrying capacity of their land, whether they carry stock or not. Sugar-cane farmers are exempt from this levy and NSW is the only state in Australia that has Rural Land Protection Boards.

The Tweed -Lismore Rural Lands Protection Board does not spend money in protecting the land: The money goes to support plush offices and wages for paperwork to collect rate-payer's money (see breakdown on front page).

We all still have a choice in Australia to say what we want and the signing of a petition can change matters like this in Parliament. It is time this out-dated board was dissolved with its gross wastage of landholders money.

Please sign and help make changes so that we can put our money into our land instead of stamps.

To the Honourable the President and Members of the Legislative Council of New South Wales




