villages specially designed by people with a vision of living sustainably closer to nature and in arrangements that encourage living in closer relationship with neighbours.


The fact that following a study tour that focussed on eco-villages the Byron Council's director responsible for environmental and strategic planning has returned so enthusiastic about this form of development is of great significance. He was particularly impressed by the examples where he saw residents enjoying a high qualify of life, a diversity of employment and business enterprises and resultant social and economic benefits for the locality where they were.

Mr Kanaley evidently sees eco-village development as providing for lifestyle options that would be of benefit to the community to encourage, and Council's planning instruments, he says, will accommodate it.

To provide more understanding of what is going on overseas, the Sustainability Research Institute will be showing films of two outstanding European eco-villages in the Mullumbimby Civic Hall on Thursday July 13 at 5.30pm. I hope many people will take the opportunity to see these and to discuss, following the films, the issues they raise. There are significant environmental, social and economic benefits that could flow from Council's support, and greater community consideration of the potential possibilities offered by these community developments would be timely, particularly in regard to local self-reliance in a globalising world. I encourage everyone to come along.

Eco-village presentation
