#### BACKGROUND TO MULTIPLE OCCUPANCY COMMUNITIES IN NSW

**MULTIPLE OCCUPANCY: History of its Introduction** 



After the Aquarius Festival in Nimbin in 1973 many participants wanted to settle in the north east corner of NSW. This area has come to be known as the Rainbow Region.

Up to 1980 planning legislation permit-

ted one dwelling house per 40ha (100 acres) on rural land. Confronted with this situation many new settlers chose to build illegally while campaigning for the planning legislation to be changed to permit the communal sharing of rural land.

As a result of this campaigning Paul Landa, Minister for Planning in the Wran Government in 1979 held a "Hamlet Seminar" in Lismore and in the following year gazetted 23 properties in the Lismore City Council area thereby making these legal Multiple Occupancies (MO).

In 1988 Bob Carr, Minister for Environment and Planning in the Wran Government introduced a State Environmental Planning Policy (SEPP) - 15 for the Multiple Occupancy of Rural Land. The aim of this policy was to encourage the collective ownership of land (with subdivision prohibited); the construction of low cost dwellings and generally to provide an environmentally sensitive approach to community based rural settlement.

In 1994 there were a total of 251 MOs in 20 of the 67 Local Government Areas (LGA) in NSW. Some 80% of these are located in the 8 LGAs in the Rainbow Region. There are some 64 MOs in the Lismore City Council area.

MOs vary in size between 10 to 80 ha. Most MOs have about 9-12 dwellings per property. (A few large communities raise the statistical average to 15 dwellings). Each dwelling has an occupancy of about two persons per dwelling.

It is estimated that there are now in excess of 7000 MO residents in NSW. As at 1994 some 75% of the MO

"household" incomes were under \$20,000 pa. MOs once established, have had a low to medium turnover of resident members.

In 1994 Robert Webster, Minister for Planning in the in the Fahey Government, repealed SEPP-15 on the ground that this Policy "no longer had a statewide application"!

Existing MOs remain legal and may expand in accordance with an existing approved Development Application.

Councils may now introduce provisions in their planning instruments to permit new MOs. To date the only Council to consider this has been the Lismore City Council where the decision was not to do so. Three Councils which had in place provision for MOs in their planning legislation prior to the repeal of SEPP-15 continue to approve new MOs.

The ALP at the time of the 1994 State Election made an electoral promise to reinstate SEPP-15. As yet the Carr government has not done so despite continual lobbing by Pan Com.

In every Lismore City Council election since 1977 there has been an MO resident elected as a Councillor. In this time there have been four such Councillors with the current Councillor being Diana Roberts.

#### HOME BUILDERS ASSOCIATION



The Homebuilders Association (HBA) was formed in 1977 in response to demolition orders issued by Lismore City Council on a number of illegal dwellings. Its charter was "to promote, publicise and further the interests of owner-builders in the Rainbow region" and to act as a representative body for MO resi-

dents. The HBA persuaded the Council to withhold the demolition orders.

HBA members assisted Sydney University's "Technical Assistance Group" in the preparation of the "Low Cost Country Homebuilding" Handbook. This Handbook was published by the Dept. of Environment and Planning in 1982 and is still a standard reference work.


#### RURAL RESETTLEMENT TASK FORCE



The formation in 1983 of the Rural Resettlement Task Force (RRTF) grew out of the need for a formal Association in the negotiations with the NSW Lands Commission to initiate a government supported, pilot MO community settlement. With a change of Government this Project was dropped!

The RRTF represented MO communities in a Commission of Inquiry into MO development in the Tweed Shire area, and assisted new settlers in many Court Appeals in connection with MO Development Applications to the relevant Council. The RRTF initiated the first draft of what became SEPP-15.

#### PAN COMMUNITY COUNCIL



Pan Community Council (Pan Com) was formed in 1987 with the primary aim of promoting social interaction between communities; assisting in dealings with councils and government bodies; fostering sustainable economic initiatives, and protecting the environment.

Pan Com produces a Newsletter, holds community meetings, lobbies the Government and its Departments and issues media statements on policy matters. It produced a model MO Development Control Plan for use by Councils as an aid in the implementation of the former SEPP-15.

I have been invited to attend as an observer at the planner's meeting in the morning.)

Background and Overview of the DUAP visit.

The Mayor of Bellingen Council (Sue Deathbridge) asked DUAP to visit councils in the north coast with a view to discussing the Policy. All the north coast councils were advised of this. David Kanaley initiated a proposal for two reps from all the councils in the far north coast to attend a meeting at Mullum. (It is expected that there may be two planners or a planner and a councillor.) Diana will be attending representing LCC.

The meeting at Bellingen will take place on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> March. The Bellingen Multiple Occupancy Action Group (MOAG) will have a private meeting with the DUAP party in the afternoon and expect to inspect one or two MO's. (Note. None of the DUAP party have ever been on an MO and hence I have gone to pains to arranging brief visits to MO's both here and in Bellingen.)

The meeting with the council planners etc is scheduled for 10.00am to 12.30pm. David says it is rare for council planners to get together in this way and that he for one has no idea what stance planners and councillors in other areas have on MO and their reasons for their position.

Council will be providing lunch for the planners etc from 12.30 pm - 1.30pm.

The meeting with Pan Com is scheduled for 1.30pm - 4.00pm.

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From 4.00pm to about 4.45pm David has arranged for a visit to "Gondwana Sanctuary" at Tyagarah. All of those in attendance at our meeting are invited to attend this visit.

The DUAP party will then visit, (at Pan Com's invitation) "Jagera" (Rob's community at Whian Whian) on their way to Lismore where they will stay the night and return to Sydney the following morning by plane.

Pan Com members who wish to join the visit to "Jegera" are invited to join the convey at Tyagarah. It is not expected this visit will spend more than about 20 - 30 minutes on site.

Meeting Procedure. As will be appreciated the Pan Com Meeting is tight on time. We need to make the best use of the time available!

Note in my correspondence to Roger Elliott of 14<sup>th</sup> that I have invited him to highlight particular issues of concern etc to the Dept. so that we can consider giving these priority on our agenda. Apart from this as I see it we can select those items to which we give priority, or simply work sequentially through what is left.

If we get through all or most of this, I would consider the meeting to have been a successful achievement!

Personally I do not see that issues about which there may be disagreement need be debated out. For me what is important is to sus out those issues about which there is agreement or disagreement and if possible in the latter case, get some indication of the reasons for their stance, so that we can take this on board in our written submissions.

Anything we can do to establish a good social connection I believe will be priceless!

In view of the tight day schedule I would ask that everyone be on hand say about 1.20pm ready for a prompt start.

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

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

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
